

Finding articles in medical statistics

If the statistical method used is immaterial, or you want to explore methods used, use a standard template like PICO or SPICE. To find articles that use a particular statistical method, try these variants.

To find an article that uses a particular statistical method, try PIMO:

Keywords, synonyms, limits

If a particular study type is the method, or likely to use the method of interest, try **PISO**:

S in PISO could be a publication type limit (note that publication type limits are not always consistently applied in Medline) or a search filter.

PIMO and PISO may not find the same results, so you might want to use both and OR the two sets of results.

An example

Topic: Studies using logistical models to look at risk factors for development of diabetic foot in 50 year olds

Using PIMO, we get:

P - fifty year olds

I – risk factors (the general term "risk factors" and specific risk factors like diet, lifestyle)

M – logistical models

O - diabetic foot
